Hi –

There are literally dozens of reasons why Brett Kavanaugh should not be confirmed. Here is a sample:

- 1) Policy issue: It's clear from his record and from what he said – and didn't say – during his testimony that he will overturn the right to choose at the first opportunity.
- 2) Policy issue: The guy is a gun nut.
- 3) Policy issue: His views of executive authority and presidential immunity are waaaaay outside the mainstream. There are plenty of ultra-conservative jurists to choose from, but this issue really sets Kavanaugh apart from the herd. I assume this is why he got the nomination.
